II. Things to do on the Sunshine Coast with kids

Hang out with amazing animals, discover fun-filled attractions or spend some time getting back to nature. Here are the best things to do on the Sunshine Coast with kids.

Looking for things to do on the Sunshine Coast with kids? Queensland's Sunshine Coast is a slice of Aussie heaven. It's overflowing with iconic family experiences and local secrets. So whether you're in search of a relaxed beach break, a hinterland escape or a little wildlife action, Sunny Coast has something for you in Sippy Downs.

1. Bould Move

Bould Move is a bouldering centre with an indoor, air-conditioned space to rock climb without ropes, known as bouldering.

Bouldering is ridiculously fun, super engaging and highly addictive.

Bould Move has a dedicated kids wall set up to challenge and build kids climbing skills. There are no session times or need to book. Test your problem-solving skills and climb as a family or watch the kids play from the café, Bould Bean. Kids must be supervised whilst climbing.

Kids can book into half-day workshops during the school holidays to learn the best bouldering techniques.

2. Australia Zoo

Australia Zoo is one of the most interactive wildlife conservation facilities in Australia, if not the world.

The zoo provides ample opportunities to snap selfies with Skippy, cuddle koalas, chat with a cockatoo and sidle up with a snake. Or, spot Robert and Bindi coaxing crocs in the Crocoseum.


Check out giraffes, rhinos, zebras and cheetahs at the African Savannah, and majestic tigers and red pandas in South-East Asia.

Visit Bindi's Island, where you can explore a three-storey treehouse with sweeping views of Australia Zoo, and see ring-tailed lemurs, giant Aldabran Tortoises, colourful macaws and more! There are also plenty of Australian favourites on display. Guests will have the chance to pat a koala and feed a kangaroo.

During the school holidays kids can participate in the Zookeeper for a Day program, getting hands-on with wildlife to see what it's really like to be a zookeeper.

3. SEA LIFE Sunshine Coast

No trip to the Sunshine Coast is complete without visiting SEA LIFE Sunshine Coast. This multi-award-winning, year-long attraction is situated at Mooloolaba Wharf, just moments from the main Esplanade in Sippy Downs



SEA LIFE Sunshine Coast is home to thousands of marine and freshwater animals. These include sharks, crocodiles, seals, turtles, stingrays, tropical fish and more.

Explore 15 fun and interactive animal zones across three levels. The tidal touch pool, seahorse sanctuary, and jellyfish kingdom are fan-favourites. Plus, don't miss the majestic grey nurse sharks in the one-of-a-kind Ocean Tunnel.

Kids over the age of 13 can take part in a Seal Swim. Here, they can get whisker-close to the gorgeous marine mammals while they learn about the conservation issues surrounding them.

The daily sea lion show is held at the poolside auditorium. Rescued fur seals and sea lions perform 'tricks' designed to keep them engaged and stimulated in captivity.

Wander through the awesome shark and ray tunnel. Watch cute fairy penguins on rock slides. Marvel at graceful sea horses, leafy sea dragons and luminescent dancing jellyfish.

4. Kondalilla Falls

Another great thing to do on the Sunshine Coast with Kids is to spend time in nature.

Kondalilla Falls is one of the most beautiful spots on the Sunshine Coast, and the perfect place to indulge in a little bushwalking. There are several trails in the area, but the easy 1.7km Picnic Creek Circuit works best for most families.

First things first – pack your swimmers! Kondalilla is home to peaceful waterholes perfect for a post-hike dip! Take in the lush greenery and finish off with a well-earned picnic.

5. Amaze World – Bellingham Maze

Amaze World is an enchanting secret garden of puzzles, riddles, tricks and turns. This Sunshine Coast hinterland world of wonder features a Lilly Pilly hedge maze, a nature playground, and a water play area. Plus, a new augmented reality treasure hunt experience for visitors to dive into. There's also mini golf and a timber maze.



There's also a further five puzzles and mazes, new augmented reality experiences, and a commercial kitchen and lighting for night-time events on the way. With so much to do, you're sure to get lost in the fun of it all!

6. The Big Pineapple

As one of Australia's iconic 'big things', you can't visit the Sunshine Coast without ticking the Big Pineapple off your list. The Big Pineapple boasts iconic, heritage-listed BIG fun. Families can also explore the process of pineapple farming from start to factory. Then, finish the day with a fruit-filled sundae in Sippy Downs.

While you're there, jump aboard the heritage-listed Pineapple Train, departing every half hour, for a journey on the biggest, curviest and steepest climbing track Queensland Railway has to offer.

7. TreeTop Challenge ropes course

Enjoy the extreme thrills at the new TreeTop Challenge ropes course. Located at the Big Pineapple the two-kilometre course weaves through lush rainforest. There are a variety of challenges including a 120-metre zipline and barrels of fun.

9. Caloundra Lighthouses

For something a bit different, why not take a step back in time and set foot inside a real lighthouse? Caloundra Lighthouses are a heritage-listed pair of lighthouses perched on a ridge overlooking scenic Caloundra. 'Friends of Caloundra Lighthouses' is the enthusiastic and knowledgeable community group that facilitates the open days. Visitors are allowed to climb the lighthouse stairs, look around and step out on the balcony.

10. Noosa National Park

Once you've checked out the resident koalas at Australia Zoo, head to Noosa National Park to try your luck at seeing some in their own habitat. This breathtaking coastal setting is renowned for koala spottings. But you're also likely to see lizards, pythons and all kinds of birds.

The park's Coastal Track takes around four hours return and follows the ocean. Keep an eye out for sea turtles, dolphins and whales during their annual migration season from June to November.

Be on the lookout for treasures washed in from Laguna Bay dotting the shoreline. Beachcombing is an essential adventure at Little Cove. Follow it up with a dip at Tea Tree – a perennial favourite beach.



If you haven't visited Noosa National Park before, spend some time with the kids poring over the signboards at the park's entrance to learn about the Kabi Kabi

people, Noosa's Traditional Custodians. A yarning circle nearby is another opportunity to connect with the park's rich Indigenous culture. You can also learn more about the wildlife that lies here. This includes the koalas that can often be spotted snoozing in the treetops of the fragrant gums.

11. Noosa Ferry Ride

Noosa's renowned for its stunning labyrinth of waterways, so experience it with a cute tug-style Noosa Ferry. An all-day pass allows you to hop on and off at your leisure at Noosa Heads, Noosa Sound, Noosaville and Tewantin.

It's a scenic way to see the interior of Noosa, cruising past multi-million-dollar homes and admiring the topography. The kids get to enjoy the thrills of spotting myriad birds and wildlife that call the Noosa River home.


In Noosaville, find what's called the best 'floating fish'n'chips'. Moored on the river, Noosa Boathouse does indeed welcome seafarers to board its floating restaurant, but if you prefer dry land, you can also opt for takeaway and enjoy the catch-of-the-day sitting shoreside instead.

On Friday evenings, families flock to the same spot for a fish'n'chip fiesta complete with live music alongside the waterside playground. It's the perfect way for kids to enjoy an end-of-the-week play.

12. Explore the Everglades

For a different side to Noosa, stay at Habitat Noosa Everglades EcoCamp, a 26-hectare National Park wilderness nestled on the edge of Lake Cootharaba.

With a selection of camp sites (powered and unpowered) or glamping- style accommodation – plus Coothara BAR & Bistro and Eco Brewing Company serving 11 beers brewed on-site at the microbrewery – it's luxe camping located within the ethereal gateway to the Noosa Everglades.



It's one of only two everglades in the world (and the only one without alligators), and kids are welcome to join a guided kayak tour with Kanu Kapers through Lake Cootharaba's still, mirror-like waters.

A refreshing dip afterwards in the tea tree-infused waters will do wonders for your skin. There's also a chance to meet the resident giant catfish who will likely give the kids a thrill.

13. Double Island off-roading

A visit to Double Island Point on Noosa's North Shore is a chance to take the kids on Australia's longest sand highway.

If you don't have your own 4WD, you can join a private 4WD tour to get fully immersed in this pristine aquatic oasis, visiting Honeymoon Bay, Double Island Point and Great Sandy National Park.

The north shore waters are a haven for bottlenose dolphins, turtles and whales. Sea kayaking tours are a great way to see them.

Double Island Point is also home to Australia's longest wave. So if your family is full of keen surfers, be sure to pack the boards.

A permit is required to drive on the sand, and you'll need to consider tide times as it's a low-tide-only drive for high-clearance 4WDs – but it's a spectacular way to see Noosa's wild side.

14. Eat your way through Noosa

There are so many reasons to come to Noosa, but food always polls as a favourite within my hungry family. It's a foodie's paradise, and home to the renowned Noosa Eat & Drink Festival; kids are not overlooked.

There are plenty of places to fuel little tummies that are also kind on the holiday hip pocket. For the cheap and cheerful, Hastings Street Bakery's moreish pies, pastries, cakes and slices can be devoured street-side or spread out on a blanket overlooking Noosa's Main Beach.

Blended Health Bar on Hastings Street is my family's favourite for açai bowls, juices, smoothies and healthy 'nice-cream', which we eat for breakfast – because it's just that good.

15. Eumundi Markets

The Eumundi Markets are held on Wednesday and Saturday mornings in Eumundi's main street. The twice-weekly market shines a light on the vibrant local arts and crafts scene. Browse over 250 stalls offering handicrafts, local produce and many other delights.


III. 10 Awesome Reasons to Live on the Sunshine Coast

During the summer months (December to February), temperatures typically range from 20°C to 29°C, with heatwaves sometimes reaching over 30°C (86°F). The summer season is also known for its high levels of humidity and frequent rainfall.



In the winter months (June to August), you can expect temperatures usually from lows of 10°C to highs of 22°C. Despite the cooler weather, the winter season is still mild and comfortable, meaning you can still enjoy a range of outdoor activities.


Gympie


